1	How does the school know if children need extra help and what should I do if I think my child may have special educational needs?	 We receive information from pupils' previous schools. The progress of all pupils is monitored regularly by class/subject teachers and the senior leadership team, so that when a pupil is not making expected progress in a particular area of learning the school can quickly identify the need for additional support. This will then be discussed with parents/carers and the pupil concerned. If parents/carers have concerns about the progress or attainment of their child they should in the first instance make an appointment to speak to the class teacher/form tutor to discuss their concerns, who will then liaise with our Special Needs Coordinator (SENCO) as appropriate.
2	How will school staff support my child?	Our school provision map shows the range of interventions in place in our school which may be used when we identify a need for additional support. When the school identifies the need for additional intervention to enable a pupil to make expected progress, the parents/carers will be informed of the planned support and may be invited to a meeting at the school to discuss this further. If the pupil meets the criteria for special educational needs or disabilities (SEND), a provision map will be created, detailing the exact support the pupil will receive at Wave 1, Wave 2 and Wave 3; a copy of this will be provided to parents. We will monitor the progress of all children receiving additional support to ensure that the provision we have put in place is having the impact we are expecting. Governors are responsible for monitoring the effectiveness of the provision in place for pupils identified with SEND and they will receive a report from the SENCO on the progress of pupils with SEND.
3	How will the curriculum be matched to my child's needs?	All teachers are provided with any information on the needs of individual pupils so that they can plan the learning within our curriculum to ensure that all pupils are able to make progress. Differentiation is planned for groups and individuals according to need: for example, for a child who has Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN), teachers will use simplified language and/or pictures to

We will also follow the advice given by any external agencies and wherever possible liaise with them regularly and observe them working with the children so that we can replicate this in school as closely as possible. Annual reports and once termly Parents' Evenings give all parents and carers regular feedback on their child's up to date academic levels, individual reading, writing and maths targets and any behavioural, emotional or social difficulties. When appropriate, parents/carers may be contacted midterm to discuss the support that the school are providing and how they can help their child at home: this may be a phone call or a meeting. Pupils' views will be obtained and when appropriate, they may attend all or part of any meeting.
5	What support will there be for my child's overall wellbeing?	The well-being of all of our pupils is our primary concern at Pontesbury CE Primary School. They are supported with their social and emotional development throughout the school day, through the curriculum and extra-curricular activities. Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) and Social and Emotional Aspects of Learning (SEAL) are integral to our curriculum and are also taught explicitly throughout the year. - Additional support from specialist staff is arranged as needed for individual pupils, both in and out of the classroom; a tailored personal plan may be put in place for pupils with the highest need - Our Behaviour Policy; which includes guidance on expectations, rewards and sanctions is fully understood and in place by all staff. - We regularly monitor attendance, support pupils returning to school after absence and take the necessary actions to prevent prolonged unauthorised absence. - Relevant staff are trained to support medical needs and in some cases all staff receive training. We have a medical policy in place. - Pupils' views are sought through school council and other forums.
6	What specialist services and expertise are available at or accessed by the school?	All external partners we work with are vetted in terms of safe guarding and when buying in additional services we monitor the impact of any intervention against cost, to ensure a value for money service.

Educational outside agencies include: Educational Psychology (EPS); Outreach Services, including ASD, Learning and Behavioural Support; Multicultural Development Team, which includes English as an Additional Language and Traveller Service support. Specialist health services such as Speech and Language Therapy (SALT); Specialist Medical Professionals, Hearing Impaired Service (HI); Occupational Therapy (OT); Child and Adolescent Mental Health (CAMHS). We will always look to develop strong working relationships with specialists and external agencies who can help us to support your child. We work with Social Services, the Parent Partnership Team (IASS), the local police department and work hard to develop strong links with partner secondary schools. We encourage families to visit our school with their children before joining us and where possible invite children to join us for sessions before they begin full time. We have very good relationships with our feeder settings and the settings that most of our pupils move onto; we share information to support pupils' learning and wellbeing at transition. Further support is provided as necessary for those with SEND including additional visits to the new setting, SEND staff visiting school prior to these visits to share information and develop relationships with children. This support is offered both individually and as part of an
		agreed transition programme for identified pupils.
